Drew: We've played pretty much everywhere in the continent, other than Mexico. I don't know if that would go over so well. [laughs]

Q: What's your favorite movie of all time? Tony: Star Wars Trilogy.

Tony: Yeah, mine was a tape too.

Drew: I remember I got an Extreme single. It was called "Hole Hearted." I think that was the first actual tape I ever bought with my own money. I was in like 4th or 5th grade.

Q: Name something interesting about each of you.
