Rome's Coliseum was never this much fun. Be sure to check out the newly added Coliseum if you are traveling toward Mechanicsburg. This "Entertainment Megaplex" is suited for all ages, from young children to aging adults.

The Coliseum offers an arcade, bowling alleys, tremendous food and televisions all for a relatively fair price.

The food and drinks are given at a low cost and the entertainment is priced at an average rate.

When you first walk through the door, you will have choices. Immediately to your right will be a nice, sit-down restaurant.

Here, you and your guests. whether family or friends, can enjoy freshly prepared food.

This is not the only place in the complex you can enjoy a meal, but we'll get to that later. Upstairs is the arcade section. This would mostly be relevant to younger children, but even teenagers and beyond can enjoy this atmosphere. There are several styles of arcade games including your traditional joystick arcade games like the ever so popular Tekken fighting game. Air hockey can also be played here. Engage in one-on-one competition with your friends and ensure a champion while having a fun time.

Another type of game is what I like to call the "win something" game. These are your typical games where prizes are located within the machine and you have to either line something up or grab a toy of your choice.

There are actually several games similar to that on the top floor. Finally, there are your interactive games. These generally include dance-dance revolution type games or the virtual

snowboarding or racing games. With these, the user controls the game with his or her own movements, similar to the Nintendo Wii. If you're looking for handy on game days for the diehard crowd, assuming you have fans. Behind the bowling alley is another small, open room.

This room contains multiple pool tables, a nice idea if you designated drivers or the number for a cab, you can take advantage of the Coliseum's terrific specials. They have 24 beers on tap, which



Their most recently released album, Good Apollo, I'm Burning Star IV, Volume Two: No World for Tomorrow is no disappointment. The listener is eased into the album with the first track, The Reaping. Renegade film director Paul Thomas Anderson's new film 'There Will Be Blood'

Just when it seemed that cinema was dead, Paul Thomas Anderson returns after a long departure to breathe some life into its lungs; or at least I hope he will.

Paul Thomas Anderson is one of Like any typical Altman the true renegade film directors of my generation. Along with Quentin ensemble cast, with each Tarantino, Spike Jonze, Kevin Smith and Larry Clark, Anderson remains undisputed in regard to his contributions of 1990s cinema. 
Anderson's directorial debut came in the form of "Hard Eight". Despite Julianne Moore, John The Trailor for There Will be Blood a cast featuring Gwyneth Paltrow, Samuel Jackson and John C. Reilly, it remained unnoticed with the exception of excellent critical reviews. It was Anderson's follow-up film "Boogie Nights" that made him an overnight cult figure.

Directed when he was 27, "Boogie Nights" was an extremely well written social document about the porn industry. The film begins in the 1970s

and continued through 1980s, covering the transition from film to video, and actors to amateurs. It was with this film that P.T. began using Robert Altman influenced techniques within his writing and directing. film, it contained a large character as memorable as the next.


