EXECUTIVE.

Treasury.—About \$160,000 worth of Seven-thirty bonds sent to Washington by New York houses, for redemption, have been pronounced counterfeit by Treasurer Spinner.

War Department.—It is understood that Gen. Grant will be relieved in a few days.

Post Office.—The postal treaty between the United States and Belgium has been ratified, and separate mail bags will be sent by each steamer to Belgium.

Diplomatic.—Senor Romero will leave Washington for Mexico, October 12.

STATES AND TERRITORIES.

Maine.—The wonderful Democratic reaction dwindles down, as accurate figures come in, to infinitesimal proportions. Out of the general State officers, they have not one; of the Congressmen they have not one; of 31 State Senators they have only three, and of 151 Assemblymen they must have only 43.

Massachusetts.—John Quincy Adams has accepted the Democratic nomination for Governor.

New York.—Two Fenian regiments paraded the streets of New York city, in uniform, on Tuesday morning, Oct. 8th, and afterwards had a festive time at Jones' Wood.

Pennsylvania.—Official returns from all but three counties, give Judge Sharswood a majority of 728.

California.—Col. Bulkeley and a portion of the employees of the Telegraph Company, recently engaged in opening a line through Russian America and Siberia to Russia, have returned to San Francisco.

Maryland.—The Democratic Convention met at Baltimore, Oct. 9th, and nominated Col. Oden Bowie for Governor.

Virginia.—Gen. Imboden, who has been refused permission to register in Virginia, will appeal to the Federal Courts.

Louisiana.—Jury lists for the parish of Orleans have been drawn from registered voters of both colors, by military orders.

Tennessee.—Governor Brownlow was inaugurated, Oct. 10. He spoke of Tennessee, in his inaugural address, as "the habiter of a new dawn."

Indians.—On the 5th instant, 431 lodges of Indians were assembled at Medicine Lodge Creek to attend the Peace Council, and 421 lodges were on the way thither.

City.—Councils held their stated meeting, Oct. 10. In Common Council, the Boiler Inspection bill was passed.

Novia Scotia.—The only district which sent a Confederation candidate to the House of Commons gave him 97 majority.

Fejee.—It is reported that three of the Fejee Islands, one of them possessing a fine harbor, have been ceded to the United States, and that the protectorate of the Islands has been offered to our Government.
