

News of the Week.

EXECUTIVE.

Judicial.—Judge Bryan, of the U. S. Court in Charleston, S. C., decided, Oct. 16th, that the Reconstruction laws of Congress, conferring suffrage on the negro, were valid; that the President is incompetent to restore the Southern States to the Union; and that there is no legal State government or constitution in South-Carolina.

Diplomatic.—Mr. Raester, the new Haytian Charge d'Affaires, presented his credentials to the State Department, Oct. 17th.—Gen. Hussein, Pacha of Tunis, was presented to the President by Blaquiere Bey, the Turkish Minister, Oct. 16th.

Treasury.—During the six years, ending June 30th, 1867, the expenditures for the army of the United States amounted to \$1,139,617,865. The regular cost \$59,933,916, and the volunteer, \$1,084,683,949.—The interest on the five-twenty bonds, payable on the 1st of November, amounts to \$24,069,000.—One of the counterfeiters of the seven-twenty bonds, named Cooper, has been arrested. Philadelphia is said to have been the headquarters for printing the counterfeits.—Last week's internal revenue receipts amounted to \$1,683,000.—The customs receipts at Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore, included in the report, are \$2,938,015.

Registration.—The ex-rebel Gen. Imboden has appealed to Gen. Schofield from the decision of the Registry Board rejecting his vote; but the decision is sustained by Gen. Schofield. The case will now go to the courts.

Reconstruction.—\$1,373,000 has been paid out for reconstruction expenses, leaving a deficiency.

War Department.—Two companies of artillery at Fort Mifflin, Pa., have been ordered to Fort McHenry, at Baltimore.

Patent Office.—Two hundred and thirteen patents were issued for the week ending on Tuesday, Oct. 22d.

STATES AND TERRITORIES.

Maine.—The State Constable reports that only \$200,000 worth of liquor has been bought by the State the past year, in place of the \$1,500,000 worth usually purchased.

New Hampshire.—The public lands, comprising 60,000 acres, were sold, Oct. 16th; by the State for \$25,000.

Vermont.—The funded debt amounts to \$1,375,000. It has been reduced \$275,000 the past two years.

Texas.—Galveston has recently been visited by the most destructive storm and overflow that have occurred on that island since 1837.

California.—The Judicial election in California was held, Oct. 16th. The Democrats have 10,000 majority in San Francisco.

Alaska.—The most westerly inhabited point in the territory of the United States is the Island of Atton (one of the newly acquired Russian group), in longitude 174° 10' east. This is nearly 62 degrees beyond the western cape of Washington Territory, and from our eastern limit on the New-Brumwich border is nearly 120 degrees, or one-third of the circumference of the globe.
