THE HUGUENOTS.

SMILES. The Huguenots. Their Settlement, Churches and Industries in England and Ireland. By Samuel Smiles, Author of "Self Help," &c., with an Appendix, relating to the Huguenots in America. New York: Harper & Bros. 8vo. pp. 448. For Sale by J. B. Lippincott & Co.

The author of this volume has given much attention to the higher forms of manual labor, and has written several works of a biographical and practical character in this department, as: "Self Help," "Lives of the Engineers," &c. These studies have led him to see how deeply England is indebted for her manufacturing supremacy to the exiled Huguenots, flying to her hospitable shores for refuge, and very naturally he was allured to writing a history of this people, with special reference to their influence upon the manufactures of the civilized world. Mr. Smiles gives us the old and sorrowful glorious story of bloody tyranny endured heroically for conscience' sake, of France robbed of the wholesome and most necessary element in her population and made a prey to an indelity just as bloody and destructive as her superstition had been, and of her nations, more enlightened, giving an asylum to the exiles and so reaping the most solid and enduring advantages from having such a noble, active and ingenious element infused into their own population. The history is given in a clear and straightforward manner, without much enthusiasm, yet with full sympathy for the Huguenots in their grievous sufferings, and the end they had in view. The appendix contains a paper on the Early Settlements of Foreign Artisans in England; a full account of each of the French churches in London; twenty-eight pages of brief biographical notices of prominent Huguenot exiles; and finally a full and interesting paper on the Huguenots of our own country, by Hon. G. P. Bowers. While the book, by no means, surpasses Weiss' History of the French Protestant Refugees, it is in more popular style, and it gives the facts in the form of a continuous history, which Weiss does not. The Appendix, we believe, is the first connected account of the Huguenot element in our own country. It is very handsomely printed and bound.

BEER. The Far East, or Letters from Egypt, Palestine, and other lands of the Orient. By N. C. Barr, D. D., Author of "Hours among the Gospels." Cincinnati: E. W. Carroll & Co. 12mo. pp. 396.

This is one of the most delightful and instructive of recent books of travel. Designed, in the first place, for newspaper publication, it has all the freshness and piquancy of the best of that kind of writing. Much information that is new, is agreeably communicated in every part of the volume, and the heart of the Christian will be drawn out in sympathy as he follows, through the Holy Land, the footsteps of one whose earnest and thorough study of the Scriptures, and whose warm devotional spirit have rendered him so competent as a guide through these consecrated scenes. The volume is illustrated with numerous small maps, by no means in the best style of art, yet materially aiding the text.

McKEEVER.—Woodcliff. By Harriet B. McKeever. 12mo. pp. 404. J. P. Skelly & Co.

These volumes are already favorably known to religious and juvenile readers. They are delightful pictures of domestic life, skillfully constructed so as by contrast to bring out more effectively the supreme excellence of piety. The narrative is animated, the characters are various and well distinguished, the incidents are entertaining without being extravagant; a true Christian grace and refinement pervade the style and govern both stories. Messrs. Skelly & Co. have recently become owners of the copy-right, plates, &c., and have issued the volumes in a neat and attractive style.

THE ATLANTIC ALMANAC. Edited by O. W. Holmes & Donald Mitchell. Boston: Ticknor & Fields. Price of the Atlantic Monthly. 4to. pp. 64.

This is quite a novelty in American Almanacs. It covers, to begin with, are as fine specimens of artistic drawing and color printing as one ever saw. The contents under the lead of such accomplished writers as Holmes and Mitchell, with the aid of Dickens, Gail Hamilton, H. W. Beecher, Emerson, Mrs. Agassiz, and others, are as varied, fresh, appropriate and entertaining as can be. The numerous illustrations are both in color and the latter, four in number, cover each a full page, and intended to represent persons. At least two of these must be set as mere failures; daubs in which the general effect only is preserved, while the details are false but a mass of colors. Those, however, are exceptions to the general elegance which characterizes the graphic parts of the Almanac. The illustrations are sufficiently full, being adapted to the various subjects of Postage and Ship Duties.

Still another edition of this Dictionary of the English Language is announced in America, making at least the fourth issued here, besides editions printed in England, with the imprint of American houses.
