Editor's Cable.

BREN .- The New Testament; Notes, Pictorial Illustrations, and References. Vol. I. The Four Gospels; With a Chronological History. By Israel P. Warren. 8vo., pp. 386. Boston: American Tract Society.

An admirably contrived apparatus for facilitaing the study of the Scriptures. Its exterior is nusually attractive and elegant, the typography, ress work, and tinted paper being among the nest specimens of the art. It is preceded by a hronological harmony of the Gospels, which closey follows Dr. Robinson, each section being numered. The text itself is divided into correspondng sections, numbered in the same manner. Thus, he opening of Matthew's Gospel is § 6, while he opening of Luke is § 1. Thus the relative osition of each portion of the Gospels in the Harmony is seen at a glance. The notes are rief expositions of difficult points, followed by qually brief and pointed suggestive practical omments on the principal ideas of the passage. ot a line of space is lost by unnecessary multification of words." The student who has little ime to spare, will be likely to find at once what he needs. It embodies results rather than prosses. An alphabetical index of subjects closes he volume, which is a credit to the Society isuing it, and which will be likely to attain wide popularity.

INCKE. The Duty and the Discipline of Extemporary Preaching. By F. Barham Zincke, Vicar of Wherstead, and Chaplain in Ordinary to the Queen. Published by arrangement with the Author. 12mo. 262 pp. New York: C. Scribner & Co. \$1.50.

This is a very simple, unelaborate, and yet efective plea for the practice, and argument for the racticability, of extempore preaching. Its chief nterest and value lie in its being a transcript of the writer's own experience in the effort to train himself to this kind of preaching. The book vas written originally for the considerably different circumstance of ministers of the Church of England. The author is afraid of too much heology in the pulpit; in what pulpits does he ind it at this day? and he thinks that the Liurgy "provides with more than human insight. or everything that a religious service or public worship can require." Nevertheless, the subject is viewed from a novel point, and the book will prove interesting and valuable to the profession.

GOLDEN TRUTHS. "A Word fitly spoken is like apples of Gold in pictures of silver." 16mo. 243 pp. Boston: Lee & Shepard.

An exceedingly tasteful and elegant religious coliday book. The selections are made from the highest range of devotional thought in proseand verse. The richest paragraphs of Tauler, enelon, Tholuck, Jeremy Taylor, Austin Phelps, Chalmers, Guthrie, Dr. James Han ilton, Trench, Bushnell, F. W. Robertson and others, with poetry to correspond from Mrs. Browning, Jean Ingelow, Gerhardt, Spitta, Whittier, &c., upon such topics as The Inner Life (Love to God, Prayer, Sorrow for Sin, Faith and Trust, Joy and Peace,) Trials by the Way, Work for Christ, The Unfailing Friend, The Heavenly Home, form the best collection of the many of its kind, which have been offered to the public this season.

FRED, AND MARIA, AND ME. By the Author of "The Flower of the Family." Illustrated by W. Magrath. sq 16mo. 71 pp., gilt. \$1.50. Published

The very sweetest of modern domestic stories. Old Aunt Avery is the dearest old lady that ever lived in fact or fiction. Blessings on her simple childlike trust and goodness of heart! Where they seemed to be almost as pearls before swine they save everything. The world is better for such illustrations of the Gospel and such warnings against worldliness.

LETTERS TO A YOUNG CHRISTIAN.—By a Lady. 24mo., pp. 174. Boston: American Tract Society.

A book full of wise tender practical counsels to the inexperienced beginner in the Christian life. It is written in friendly and agreeable style and is w rthy a place among the pastor's aid in the care of the lambs of his flock.

FAN FAN.—Home to Christmas, 16mo., pp. 231. \$1. New York: Broughton & Wyman.

It is the devout and saintly grandpa,—the last few weeks of whose beautiful life are depicted in elegant but simple language in this volume, -who 'goes home to Christmas." His expectations and longings for release are made to keep pace in the story with the preparations for the holiday, and his peaceful death on Christmas Eve is told with a masterly skill and appreciation of the exalted Christian elements of the story. It is beautifully printed, bound, and illustrated.

S. T. C.-Waggie and Wattie; or, Nothing in Vain. By S. T. C. author of "Little Door-keeper." 18mo. pp. 192. Philadelphia: J. P. Skelly & Co.






