Since April, 1867, they have been self-supporting. The total amount raised for all purposes in three years exceeds \$3,500."—Cor Herald.—The "Olivet Presbyterian church" was organized on the Potrero, in San Francisco, on Sunday, April 12th, by the Commission from the Presbytery of San Francisco. A fair audience (says the Occident) was present at the organization, which comprises eleven members, and the proceedings were attended with an interest even beyond that usually manifested on occasions of this nature.—The Church in Portsmouth, O., received at its communion in May, forty three to communion, thirty-one by examination, and eleven of these by baptism, making ninety in three months. PRESBYTERIES.—Huron has dissolved the pastoral relation between Rev. D. E. Wells and the church at Monroeville. [The First church of Red Wing, Minn., have given him a unanimous call to become their pastor.] The pastoral relation between Rev. J. D. McCord and the church at Plymouth was dissolved at the same time he having accepted a call from the Presbyterian church at Mishawaka, Ind .- The Presbytery of Madison held its spring meeting at Rising Sun, on the 14th and 15th. Seasons of refreshing have been enjoyed in the most of the congregations, and in some of them the interest has been quite marked. Rev. L. E. Jones was received from the Presbytery of Dayton, and is now stated supply for the church at Rising Sun. Rev. T. F. Chafer was dismissed to the Aurora Congregational Association of Illinois. The church of Lawrenceburg which had been dismissed by certificate from the Old School Presbytery of Madison was received. This church having extended a call to Mr. J. R. Mitchell, of Lane Seminary, to become their pastor, Presbytery will hold an adjourned meeting in Lawrenceburg, May 20th, for the purpose of receiving, ordaining and installing him.-Jefferson City, Mo. On Sabbath, March 29th. a Committee of the Presbytery of St. Louis met in this city, the capital of the State, and installed Rev. J. Addison Whitaker pastor of the church. Rev. John C. Downer presided and proposed the constitutional questions; Rev. Samuel M. Morton preached the sermon; Rev. Raphael Kessler delivered the charge to the pastor; and Rev. John E. Worth delivered the charge to the people; Rev. Mr. Johnson, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, North, offered the closing prayer. This was the first installation of a pastor that ever took place in that city. Mr. Whitaker has been doing a great work in that most difficult and apparently hopeless field. He came there two years ago, there was then no church organization nor edifice; he has now both. Only a few weeks ago they removed from a public hall, to their newly erected beautiful chapel, which is a gem of its kind. It is built in the Gothic style, of brick, with a white limestone base; has stained glass windows and has a Sabbath-school room above the audience room. It is built with a view to future increase and enlargement, when the present chapel is to become the lecture room of a church of larger dimensions. (Cor. Evangelist. Cincinnati.—Last Sabbath evening, Rev. C. H. Taylor, D. D., was installed pastor of the Third Presbyterian church of this city. A large congregation were in attendance. Both Old and New School ministers were present and participated in the services. Rev. J. B. Stewart, (O. S.), read the Scriptures. Rev. J. L. Robertson, (N. S.), presided, made the opening prayer and delivered the charge to the pastor, and Rev. C. L. Thomson, (O.S.), delivered the charge to the congregation. Rev. Joseph Chester. (N. S.), offered the installation prayer. The sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. Nelson, of Lane Seminary, from John x. 27: "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them and they follow me." The discussion was clear, exhaustive, and listened to with unflagging interest throughout. Herald of May 14th.—The Presbytery of Kansas numbers ten ministers and eighteen churches. There have been longer and more extensive outpourings of the Spirit in Kansas during the last six months than ever before. Church building is becoming epidemic, and gives promise of great and permanent good.—The Stated Clerk says: "Some of us think that inasmuch as our Presbyterial Committee is not much regarded at No. 150 Nassau street, New York, it is hardly worth our while to appoint such a committee. To appoint a committee and have their action ignored does not seem to be exactly the thing. The tendency of Assembly's Boards and Committees seems to be, to the exercise of power, detrimental to the rights of Presbytery."-Milwaukee has appointed as commissioners to the next Gen. Assembly Rev. J. Eddy and Elder V. C. West, with Rev. P. S. Van Nest and Elder R. R. Price Alternates. At a late meeting there was a larger representation of the Eldership present then at any one previous.

During the year one church and four laboring brethren in the ministry have been enrolled, and the only remaining vacant American Church have secured the services of an able, faithful Pastor; who will enter upon his labors on his return from General Assembly. There will then remain only two churches under care of Presbytery vacant, a Holland and Bohemian church, Both of these present a wide and important field. but thay have been unable to obtain Pastors conversant with their language. The Bohemian Church are now educating two of their young men to meet this deficiency. The reports of the churches presented a generally increasing vigor and Christian devotedness. Their efforts to become self sustaining are highly encouraging. But what was most cheering was the very general report of a work of grace. All but one of the churches that have enjoyed the stated ministry during the year have been thus visited. Never before since its organization; has this Presbytery been enabled to record such general displays of Divine Power. To God be all the glory, G. W

THE CHURCH IN NEW YORK.

MR. EDITOR: - Your cotemporary, the Christian Instructor, the United Presbyterian paper of 1870, \$6,500,000, making a total of more than this city, is, in the kindness of its heart, always very "good at helping the lame man over the stile." Last summer it found a congregation for Dr. Crawford, thereby swelling the roll of the more than four times the annual interest liabilities; and the net Second Reformed Presbytery of Philadelphia surplus for the present year, after payment of expenses and intevery considerably, making it two pastors and two congregations, instead of two pastors and one congregation, and took no notice of your correction of the misstatement. More recently it discovered three students who had just completed their fourth year in our Theological Seminary. Now it makes it appear that we have not lost so much after all by the secession of the Second R. P. Church of New York City, as it informs its readers that our Northern "Presbytery recognized those who did not go over, as the Second Church." In your last Mr. Chambers informed us that the only person who did not go with him into the O. S. Presbyterian Church was a lady who did "go over" to the U.P. Church. So that the persons now recognized as the Second Church are simply, nobody; or else one lady member of the Church represented by the Instructor, has been recognized as a R. P. Church.

This statement of the Instructor is evidently made in all good faith, and indeed is not unjustifiable if the editor had no other source of information than the R. P. Advocate. But what a comment it furnishes on the dis ingenuous candor of the Northern Reformed Presbytery! Would not a rule forbidding Presbyteries to pass "Buncombe" resolutions be a timely addition to our Book of Discipline?

A propos of Mr. Chambers' letter, is he perfeetly correct in saying that there are members enough of our denomination in the city of New York to form "a respectably sized congregation?" What are the figures? A member of our church reformer resident within the bounds of that Presbytery gives it as his decided opinion that the entire membership of our Church within the bounds of the Northern Reformed Presbytery is about equal to that of the Broad St. Church of this city (Rev. Dr. Wylie's.) If this is not so, may I further ask why has all the opposition (active and passive) to the procuring of correct denominational statistics come from that quarter?
