Maryland.—A border State colored Convention met at Baltimore, August 4.—The Convention at Baltimore, adjourned sine die, August 5. Arrangements were made for the organization of the colored people in the Border States, and for holding a National Colored Convention next January. Resolutions were adopted supporting Grant and Colfax, and asking the colored citizens to sustain their own schools after the discontinuance of the Freed-

men's Bureau.
Indiana.—The inhabitants of Seymour, though they have lynched six of the desperadoes in that neighborhood, have not yet entirely broken up the gang. The mother of two of the villians threatens that if her sons are touched, the village shall be laid in ashes. The Vigilance Committee, on the other hand, threaten that if any one of their own number is molested, fifteen or twenty more who have been guilty of crimes meriting death shall be hung. They claim that the courts are powerless to execute jus tice in the regular way.

California.—The San Francisco mails are

more transported upon the Pacific steamers, but come to us overland, thus saving one-third the usual time.

Arizona.—Indian outrages continue to be reported, and it is intimated that they are committed by Indians who draw rations from the Government.

Alabama.—The House of Representatives has

passed the bill prohibiting the separation of negroes from whites in public conveyances.—The Senate, Aug. 5, passed a bill removing political disabilities.—The House has concurred in the Senate bill removing the disabilities of persons not allowed to vote by the State Constitution. The Senate has passed the bill giving the election of Presidential electors to the Legislature.—The House, Aug. 8, after rejecting the bill authorizing the Legislature to cast the Electoral vote of the State, reconsidered its action, and concurred in the bill by a vote of 48 to

Kentucky.-Later returns of the election indicate a Democratic majority of nearly 90,000. Florida.—The Legislature has passed a bill authorizing the Governor to appoint a secret police throughout the State.—The Legislature has passed over the Governor's veto, a bill giving the members one year's salary for service from June to December, and has adjourned until November 3d, when both Houses will choose Presidential electors in joint convention.—The yellow fever has appeared at Key West.

Georgia. The Augusta road, leading out of Savannah, is becoming unsafe to travellers, on account of the numerous highwaymen with which it is infested.—Bradley, a negro Senator, has resigned. Louisiana.—Gov. Warmouth, in his official requisition upon the President for a military force to secure peace, says he believes a bloody revolution is meditated, and that 150 men have been murdered there in the last month and a half. He says the mob which recently threatened the Legislature was only prevented from re-enacting the scenes of 1866. by the presence of U.S. troops.—Two Democratic members of the House have been unseated, and their seats given to Radical contestants, on the ground

of frauds in their election. Kansas.—Gen. Sheridan was fined \$100 by Judge Tholen, at Leavenworth, Aug. 6, for assault, in forcibly ejecting Postmaster Dunn from the Military Reserve. #### FOREIGN.
