er to the same end. Georgia.—The Senate has passed a resolution authorizing the Governor to suppress armed organizations.

Louisiana.-James Mann (Dem.), member of Congress, died Aug. 26, of congestion of the brain. -The House has passed a bill punishing with fin and imprisonment all distinctions on account of color, on routes of travel and in places of entertainment.-The New Orleans police have not been paid for five months.

It says this was taken as a slight by the envoys of other nationalities, and demands an explanation.—Lisbon.—The Cortes has been prorogued.—Madrid.—The Spanish Minister to Rome has resigned.

FOREIGN BY MAIL.

England .- The stockholders of the Crystal Palace vote to close it on Sundays to every body but themselves.-Baron Bramwell recently instructed a jury to give mederate damages in a breach of prom-ise case, because it was a most mischievous thing frighten a man into marrying a woman he did not like by heavy damages. The American yacht Sappho came in last,-Carlsruhe .--- The establishment of the constitution of Baden was commemorated by a grand banquet to-day, at which the Minister of War expressed the hope that the Southern States of Germany would soon reunite with those of the North, and thus complete the series of great events commenced in 1866. August 26.—London.—Disraeli has received Hon.

Reverdy Johnson at his country seat .-- Americans here are grieved at a rumor that the trans-Atlantic mail is to be conveyed exclusively by British steamers via Queenstown, Mr. Trollope having secured an agreement with the U.S. to discontinue the mail route via Southampton.—Paris.—Marshall Vaillans closed a soothing, pacific speech at Dijon with the words : "Abundance in peace, but not at the expense of patriotism !"-The Pays says France will accept the possibility of war, if Prussia refuses to disarm.-The Emperor has refused to meet the Queen of Spain at Biarritz .- Berlin .- Prussia accepts the U. S. proposals for the effective regulation of emigrant vessels, and has appointed agents to speedily arrange details.-Hong Kong, July 15.-Imperial troops, aided by European officers and engineers, have raised the siege of Tientsin and totally routed

the rebel forces. August 27.—London.—Archbishop Manning has been made a Cardinal.—Paris.—The sale of Le Figiro on the streets has been prohibited .-- Copenhagen .- Denmark objects to the proposed internationul decimal coinage.-Lisbon.-The Peers vote for a toan of nineteen million francs, and half a million to tortify Lisbon .- Rome .- Berardi succeeds Antonelli as Secretary of State and Chief Minister .--Pesth.-The Turkish troops are encountering bands of insurrectionists in Bulgaria.

August 28.—London.—The cab-men held a mon-ster meeting last night, and threatened a "strike." Japan, at late dates, was still in a very unsettled condition. The Mikado had driven the rebels north, and Yokhama was defended by foreign troops.--Paris.--The bullion in the Bank of France has increased by seven and a half million of francs .--Rochefort, editor of La Lanterne, on a second action, has been sentenced to a fine of 10,000 francs and three mouth's imprisonment. [The paper is here-atter to be printed at Brussels, to which M. Roche-fort has fiel.]-St. Petersburg.-The Imperial forces have left Samarcand, peace with Bokhara being coucluded .- Lisbon .- The mail steamer from Rio Janeiro, reports the evacuation of Humaita, July 24, and its occupation by the allies, who found 250 cannon in the fortress, and overtook and surrounded 4.000 of the retreating Paraguayans. The allies had assailed Lopes in his new position at the mouth

the Dutch Boers of the Transvaal Republic. The Boers make expeditions against the native tribes, kill the adults, and carry off the children into slavery. The Rev. Mr. Ludorf, an old Dutch miniser, stated in a public meeting of the Boers, that on one occasion, near Zoutspanberg, a "number of na-

tive children, too young to be removed, were cover-ed with long grass and burned alive," and no one contradicted him. The London Spectator says: "The British Government is determined to protect the Basutos against these raids, and the Boers have sent envoys to Europe to protest against its conduct, and procure aid for the Republic. They ought to obtain a hearty reception from the gentlemen who adhered to the South, and subscribed to the Eyre Defence Fund."

France.-Of the 53,000 children yearly born in Paris, 18 000 are put out to nurse in the provinces, more than two-thirds through the instrumentality of the "agency offices." The mortality among these nurslings is from 60 to 87 per cent. No wonder that it takes 198 years to double the population of France.

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
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
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
