members of the corporate society. The Circuit ('ourt, before which the case was first tried, decided that the act of the majority was legal, because "it was not perverting the church property to the teaching of new doctrines, but connecting itself with another branch of substantially the same church." Upon the second question, the decision was that "the right to vote should not be confined to church members; but, upon a question affecting the property of the congregation, the right of persons, not members of the church, who have largely contributed to the erection of the church and the support of its minister, to a voice, cannot reasonably be questioned." This decision of the Circuit Court was sustained by Judge Lawrence.—The Standard (Chicago.)
