The General Government.—President Grant is back at his post, and has had interviews with the heads of departments. Cabinet met on Friday, and the Cuban question was discussed.

Secretary Boutwell will buy \$2,000,000 bonds and will sell as much gold, weekly. He will prepay the November coupons with an abatement of interest.

New England.—The Republicans of Massachusetts re-nominated the present State ticket, and rejected Senator Sumner's speech against the recognition of Cuba.

France.—The Emperor is well enough to preside in Cabinet and appear in public. The Empress's health is reported as improved.

New Jersey.—Newark Republicans want Ex-Gov. Marcus L. Ward to run for Mayor.

Pennsylvania.—The State Fair began at Harrisburg on Tuesday. The rains have raised the Schuylkill four feet at Reading.

City.—Our death rate was 222 last week, 242 the week before. A monument to David M. Lyle will be begun in Old Oaks Cemetery, Oct. 4th.

Turkey.—The Khedive of Egypt has stopped the preparations for his journey to Constantinople.

Interior.—Minnesota has 5,000,000 bushels of wheat and a large amount of hay by heavy rains.
