The Electrical Technology curriculum is designed to prepare graduates for technological service with electrical utilities, manufacturers of electrical and electronic equipment, and electrical maintenance, and instrumental departments of various industrial concerns. The principal objective of the curriculum is to provide a practical knowledge of electrical machinery and its control, as well as of electronic theory and its application in communication and control systems.
