Marine Captain Visiting Campus

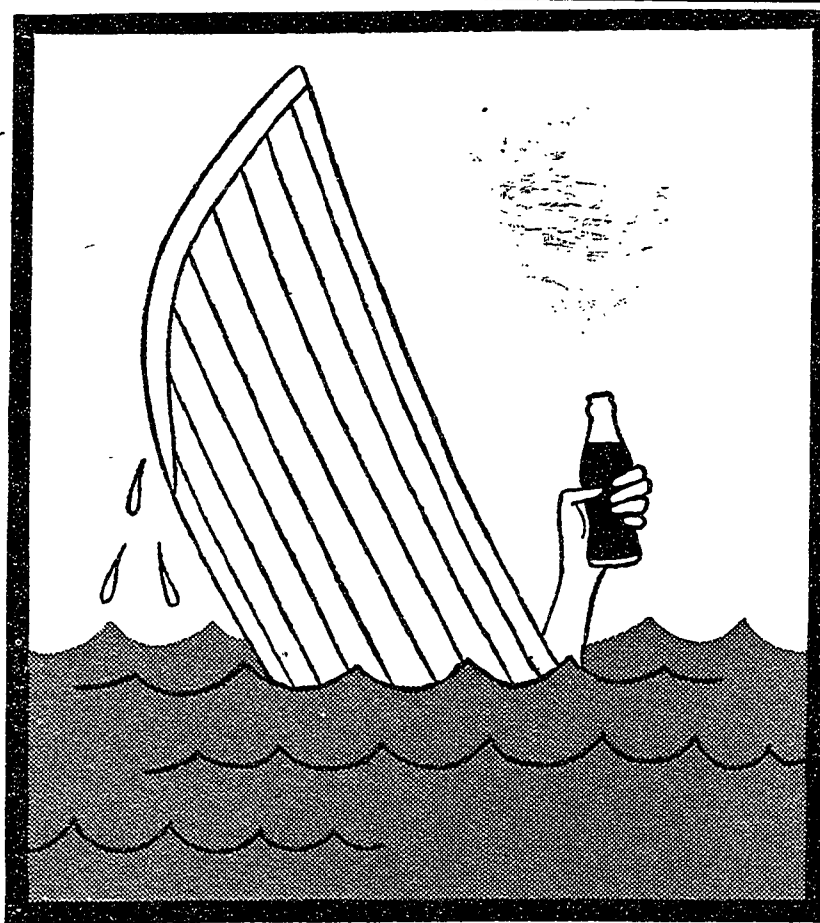
Woman Marine Captain Margaret R. Pruett, a graduate of the University of Idaho, will be visiting local colleges during the college year for the purpose of speaking to college women about serving their country in an executive capacity.

The Woman Marine Officer has become a valuable member of the peacetime team. They serve not only in the supervision of Women Marines, but in general administration, aerology, historical writing, law, and recreation services.

A limited number of college women currently are being considered for the Marine Corps Woman Officer Training Class the course which commissions women

in the Marine Corps. The course is offered to undergraduates and graduates of all accredited colleges and universities. Upon completion of the 12 week training course given at the Marine Corps Schools, Quantico, Virginia and certification of graduation from college, these young women are commissioned as Second Lieutenants in the Marine Corps Reserve and are assigned to active duty at Marine Corps posts and stations.
