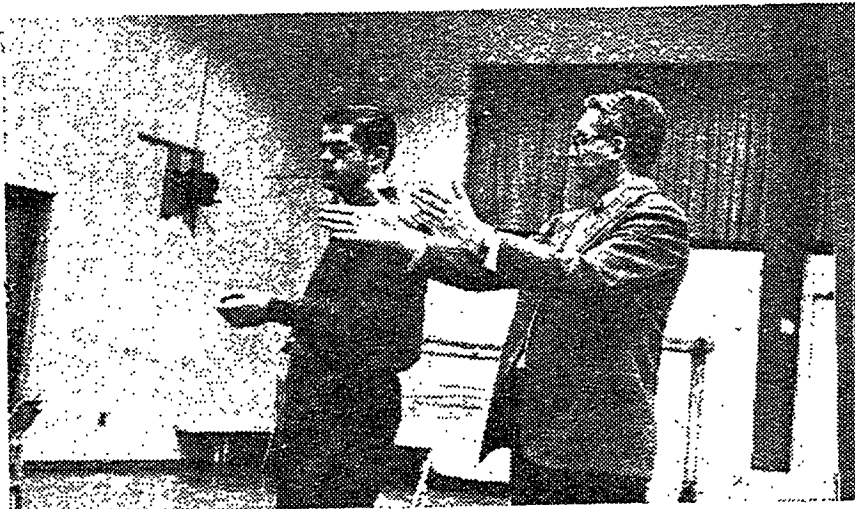

Annual Spring Play Set For May 16 and 17

The annual spring play, Antigone, has been rescheduled for May 16 and 17. It is under the direction of Dean Benjamin Lane. Antigone, by Jean Anouilh, is a modern adaptation of Sophocles' famed Theban tragedy. This ancient Greek drama of love, strife, pain, and passion will be presented in a universally digestible manner with modern costumes and dialogue, while retaining its original classic grandeur.

Lawrence Dennis Staff Member Of Peace Corps

Lawrence E. Dennis, vice president for academic affairs of the Pennsylvania State University, has been named as a member of the 14-man "nucleus staff" of the newly-created Peace Corps.

Dennis, who will have his headquarters in Washington, will assist R. Sargent Shriver, director of the Corps, as a full-time consultant with executive responsibility for carrying out the objectives of the training program.

To enable him to accept the appointment, the University has granted Dennis a six-month leave of absence which became effective March 15.

Dennis will be concerned with the selection and coordination of colleges and universities that will participate in the training. He will also deal with the actual study program and task assignments overseas.

It is expected that the training for the program will begin early this summer.

Dennis will be working closely with Dr. Arthur S. Adams of Harvard University, who has been named consultant with supervisory responsibility for the Peace Corps training program.

It is expected that 500 to 1000 volunteers will be working overseas under the pilot program by the end of the year. Their primary purpose will be to serve as teachers and helpers to United States and foreign technicians in underdeveloped areas.

The Behrend Players will attempt to enhance the dramatic qualities of this presentation with the use of the circular "island" stage, in which the audience completely surrounds the performers. Special lighting and effects will also be employed.

Term To Begin One Week Earlier

The 1961 fall term will begin one week earlier than previously scheduled so students may obtain matriculation cards needed for admittance to the Penn State-Navy football game.

The first day of registration for the term has been changed from Sept. 27 to Sept. 20, T. Reed Ferguson, director of University Relations, said recently.

The football game will be played on Sept. 23.

The change was also necessary because the game, originally scheduled during the early part of Orientation Week, would have caused traffic and "moving-in" problems for students arriving on campus, Ferguson said.

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Recent Visit Of Mrs. Behrend Leaves Students Impressed

Mrs. Mary Behrend recently visited Behrend Campus and was honored at a tea in the Memorial Room. Here she met many of the students, all of whom were impressed by her warm and friendly personality.

Mrs. Behrend is the widow of Ernst R. Behrend, founder of the Hammermill Paper Company. She shared her husband's interest in education and decided, in 1948, to pay tribute to his memory by presenting the Behrend estate, then called Glenn Hill Farm, to the Pennsylvania State University. Mrs. Behrend now resides in Greenwich, Connecticut where she engages in a number of charitable activities and pursues her hobbies of painting and world travel.

Mrs. Behrend periodically returns to her former home to meet the students who are enrolled at the campus. During her last visit, in 1958, Mrs. Behrend was awarded the Penn State Medal by President Walker. This was the first time the medal was awarded. The purpose of the award is to recognize and honor achievements of persons who have made an outstanding contribution to higher education in Pennsylvania.

On her most recent visit, Mrs. Behrend decided to the Behrend Campus 7½ acres of land adjoining the campus and fronting on Station

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Single Deposit System Instituted

A single deposit system designed to bring a variety of loss, damage, and breakage fees under one heading will be instituted at the Pennsylvania State University with the opening of the Fall Term, 1961.

Controller Carl R. Barnes says this "general deposit" will be retained by the University until a student officially withdraws or graduates. Then it will be refunded minus any charge for "equipment damages, losses, and forfeitures."

He explained that it will replace a variety of small deposits now required for residence hall rooms, military equipment, chemistry breakage, and towel and locker.

This deposit, which will be collected with tuition, will represent an outlay of \$25 for present full-time undergraduates.

The \$25 figure also will apply to all full-time students on the Commonwealth Campuses and to stu-

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
