New record additions to the Behrend library have expanded the opportunity for students to sample musical masterpieces of past and present. Mankind's moments of genius, depression, exhilaration, sorrow and fear have been captured and preserved in the works of well-known artists.

Beginning with the classical opus' of Bach, Beethoven, Wagner, and George Gershwin, the library

boasts recordings of Verdi's opera, "Aida," and Puccini's "Madame Butterfly"; orchestral selections by the Boston Pops Orchestra; and vocalists Eileen Ferrell, and Enzo Pinza. Albums entitled "Dave Brubeck a la mode," "Miles Ahead" by Miles Davis and "Blue Holiday" by Edie Haywood satisfy the modern taste for jazz.

Any interested student may borrow an album from the library for a three-day period.
