

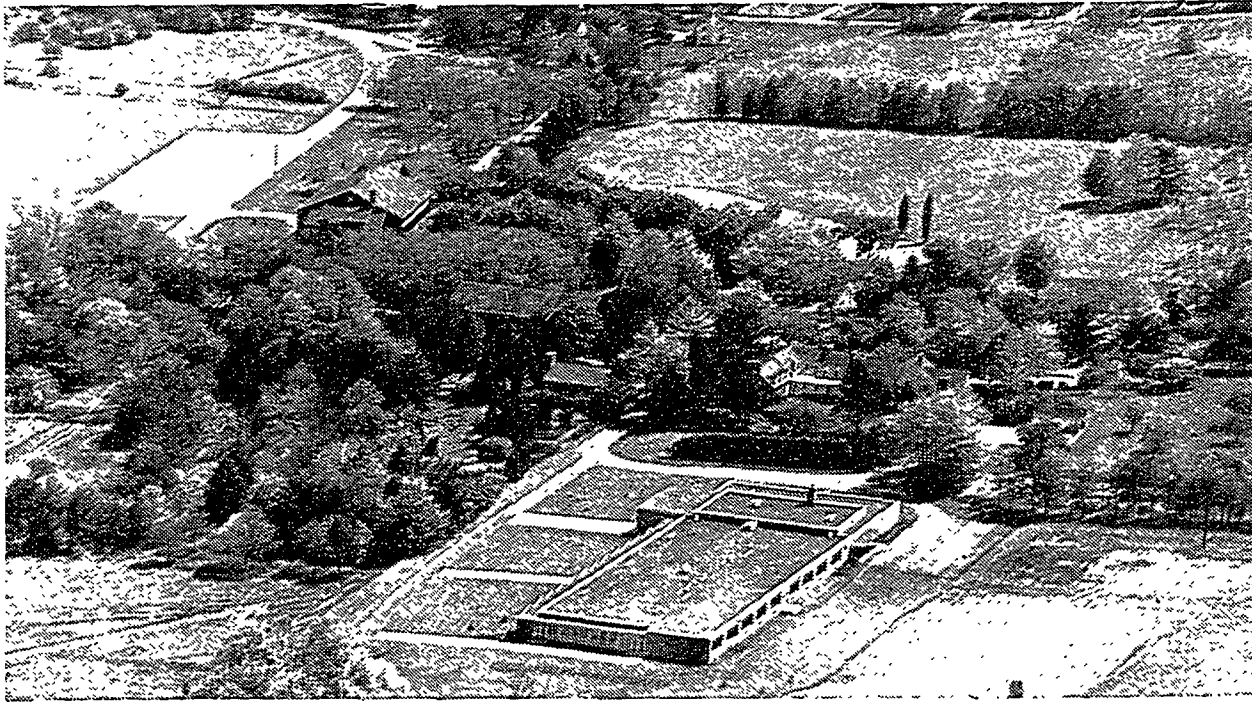

BEHREND TO EXPAND

Mr. I. Kochel, director of the Behrend Campus, reports that a proposed plan for the expansion of Behrend Campus has been formulated. This plan includes the construction of dorms, a student union building, and a library. The dorms will accommodate one hundred men and women students.

The designing of these buildings will begin in the summer or fall of this year. Construction is

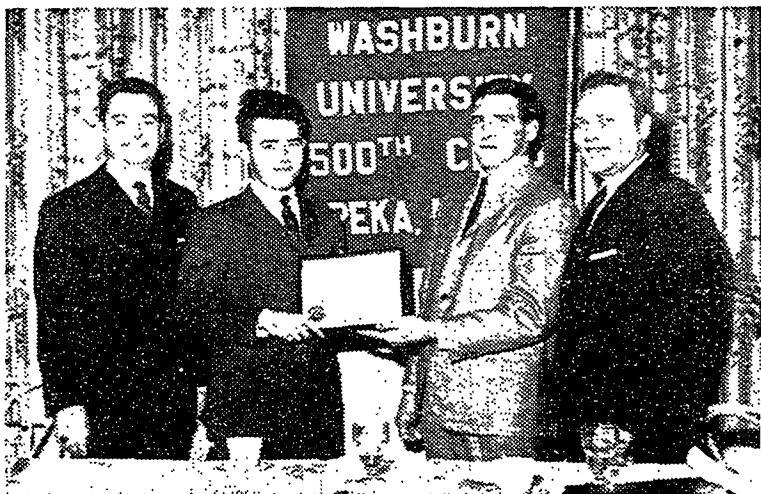
stated to begin in the spring of 1965 and should be completed by the fall of 1966.

If plans progress on schedule, Behrend Campus is expected to have between eight hundred to one thousand by 1970.

Because of this expected increase, an expansion of the faculty is anticipated. Four new faculty members are expected to fill positions in the English, engineer-

ing, biological sciences, and physics departments. Four hundred and thirty-five students are the anticipated enrollment for next fall, an increase of seventy-five since last year.

Also planned for next year is a two-year associate degree program in business. It has been proposed before the faculty of the college of business administration and has passed the first reading. If approved by the president of the university, Behrend will be the only campus to offer this two-year business course.
