STUDENT CALIBER IMPROVES

Mr. Fryer, in an exclusive interview with the NITTANY CUB, observed that students today are of higher academic quality than at any other time during his fifteen years at the Behrend Campus. Mr. Fryer likes the "hello spirit" of a small school. "It is embarrassing to walk by someone without saying hello to him."

But one of the nicest features about Behrend is the beautiful campus. "The first day I worked on the campus, I was completely enthralled with the physical features of the campus, and I'm still thrilled by it today."
