"Coeds in Fraternities Week Nights?"

Fourteen of the University fraternities, who achieve a specific average (2.577), may be allowed to have unchaperoned women staying in their houses from 7 to 11:30 P. M. on Sundays through Thursdays.

Inter-Fraternity Council President John Hunt said that approval for the plan would come from the Dean of Men's office "by the end of the week." Hunt explained that if the ruling is approved the houses that achieved higher than 2.577 last spring could be eligible for the expanded hours this term.

In the following Saturday edition of the Daily Collegian, President Walker wrote in answer: "A student, by doing such a thing, sets hi self apart from a large proportion of the population. He alienates many of his friends and narrows his range of friendships for the foreseeable future. He limits his employment possibilities and circumscribes the scope of his career, not only because his loyalty is suspected, but because his rationality is also questioned. The effect of his act on the world is

temporary, but the scar on his career lasts a lifetime.
