Minor incidents, such as a group of students departing, waving an American flag as they disappeared through the door, and various disapprovals were the only signs of disturbance within the moderately large audience (approximately 500).

On Saturday, November 6, the Highwaymen, sponsored by Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity, presented a concert to a capacity audience at Gannon Auditorium. This popular group sang many well-known songs which all brought an enthusiastic response from those present. Answering the audience's request for an encore, the Highwaymen ended then with their two biggest hits, "Michael" and "Cotton Fields."
