The Speech Department and the University Readers of the Pennsylvania State University have extended an invitation to our Behrend Readers to attend the Eighteenth Intercollegiate Interpretative Reading Festival to be held April 28 and 29. This reading festival is not a contest but an enjoyable program of reading talent from various colleges. These will be four programs covering a span of two days and all of these programs will be held in the Assembly Hall of the HUB.

Each college will participate in readings in two of the following four areas: prose, poetry, drama, or multiform. Following each reading session, Dr. Magdalene Kramer will discuss criteria for evaluating effective interpretation. Dr. Kramer, a professor of speech at Columbia University, was one of the pioneers in the field of oral interpretation to recognize the importance of pleasing emphasis on literature appreciation. She has been prominent in many professional speech organizations.

The Behrend Readers and Mrs. Falkenhagen have graciously accepted the invi-

tation. The Readers are planning to participate in the areas of prose and poetry. They will use parts of their last Common Hour presentation, "Glimpses In a Gallery" for their reading material.

The students who saw "Glimpses In a Gallery" must agree that these selections will well represent Behrend at the reading festival.

When the Readers return to Erie, they will also present the "Glimpses In a Gallery" for the Red Cross on the following Monday, May 2. We Behrend students should be very proud of our talented Readers. They seem to be greatly in demand.

Challenges of Psychological Research by Dr. Gardner Murphy in collaboration with Laura A. Dale deals with controlled experiments in telepathy, clairvoyance, apparitions, psychokinesis, and related phenomena. Dr. Murphy is one of the world's foremost psychologists.

A Moveable Feast is Ernest Hemingway's account of his life in Paris in the 1920's; the wild young years of the lost generation.

Vietnam Diary, 1964 winner of the George Polk Award, is a powerful account of the present war; written by Richard Tregaskis, author of Guadalcanal Diary.

Barron's How to Prepare for the Student Draft Deferment Test includes a comprehensive review of verbal and mathematical aspects, and ten complete verbal and ten complete mathematical aptitude test and answers.

The Proud Tower by Barbara W. Tuchman, author of The Guns of August which was a winner of the Pulitzer prize for general non-fiction, is a portrait of the world before the War: 1890-1914.
