## COLLEGE ACTIVITIES

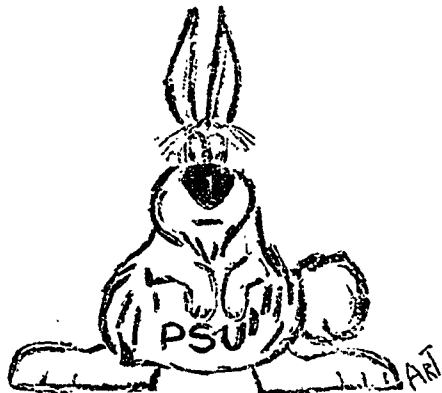
