## REACH OUT

Project Reach-Out has officially slated College Day for May 10, adding Behrend to the list of other campuses with similar programs. This day will consist of seminars, private talks and tours to help potential black Penn State students realize the feasibility of a college education.

In preparation for College Day, the Steering Committee has visited three NATO Centers for informal talks, personally adding to the list of 40 names recommended by Dr. Zipper. They are all college material and Arnie Caldwell emphasized that "students can be assured that PSU admission requirements will not be affected."

On May 10, black students and their parents will come out to Behrend from 9 to 12:30. They will meet in groups and individually with the administration for talks concerning admission requirements, costs and financial aid. Mr. Kochel has stated that no student who applies under Reach-Out will be turned away from college due to lack of money.

Later, students will be given a chance to discuss courses and majors with faculty members. They will also be conducted on a tour of the campus.

## Violence Survey

University Park, Pa., Apr.— The great majority of students at The Pennsylvania State University oppose the use of violence or disruption to effect change. This is revealed in a poll conducted by the Undergraduate Student of James L. Schwartz to determine student opinion on nine "non-negotiable demands" made to the University on Feb. 17 by a group identifying itself as the "Steering Committee to Reform the University."

## Caldwell, Lackovic Attend Regional

Arnie Caldwell, Student Body president and Regional Co-ordinator, and Gary Lackovic, SGA chairman, recently attended a conference of the West Penn North Region of Penn State Commonwealth Campuses. Along with Presidents and vice-presidents from the other campuses, they passed two important pieces of legislation.

First, they made a proposal that OSGA investigate Penn State methods of allocating student activity funds to the Commonwealth campuses.
