Soccer Team In Review

The Soccer team of Behrend Campus, led by Coach Herb Lauffer, closed out the season last Saturday at Allegheny County Community College. The strong Allegheny team shut out the Cubs with 9 goals, six of which were scored by a probable All-American, Vince Marsh.

The Cubs dominated the play for the first 5-6 minutes of the game, when Marsh set the ball rolling for Allegheny by scoring three consecutive goals. After that time Behrend was unable to get control of the ball. Allegheny had 28 goal attempts and 8 saves while Behrend only had 12 attempts and 14 saves.

Sports Views

This week, rundown on the divisional races, emphasizing teams winning more than four games. The Eastern Conference of the NFL shows two game leads for Dallas in the Capital Division and Cleveland in the Century Division. Cleveland, after having a great game against Dallas, fell to the powerful Minnesota Vikings, leaders in the Central Division. The Vikings moved for 31 first downs. Cleveland made 8 first downs. By the way, the score was 51-3. Minnesota gained 451 total yards to Cleveland's 151. Dallas regrouped forces and after being tied up with New Orleans 17-17 after the third quarter. 16 Cowboy points in the fourth quarter gave them a 33-17 win. Calvin Hill gained 109 yards on 13 carries (an 8.4 average) and Craig Morton completed 13 of 23 passes, for 319 yards and 3 touchdowns, as the undefeated Los Angeles Rams outlasted San Francisco 41-30. John Brodie passed for 338 yards on 25 completions, but the 49ers could churn only 61 yards rushing. The Rams scored on their first play from scrimmage, a 93 yard pass, Gabriel to Tucker. Baltimore seems to be coming around, as they whammed Green Bay's pursuit of Minnesota by using a balanced attack for 14-

6 win. All of the game's scoring came in the first half. John Unitas completed 15 of 25 passes, but threw 3 interceptions. Bart Starr was 13 of 28, 2 interceptions. Another team with 5 or more wins is the Detroit Lions. They are crippled with injuries to key players, but gritted to their fifth win, 27 to 21 over Atlanta. The Lions won on Bobby Williams' 96 yard kick-off return and the team churning 171 yards rushing. The AFL shows New York way ahead in the East as they beat Buffalo 16-6. The Jet defense was sharp, as was Jim Turner's foot. Jim kicked field goals of 37, 25 and 47 yards. Kansas City leads Oakland by 1/2 game in the west. K.C. stunned San Diego 27-3. In K.C.'s bag of TD's, halfback Warren McVea threw a 50 yard TD pass, and scored a second one himself. Lennie Dawson completed 17 of 24 passes. Oakland, behind Daryle Lomonia's 3 TD tosses, overpowered the Broncos 41-10. Ageless George Blanda threw a TD pass, kicked 21 and 45 yard field goals and five extra points. A pretty good day's work for the 41 year old pro. The AFL surprise package belongs to Cincinnati, as they are 4-4-1. They tied Houston 3k-3k as tsar rookie Greg Cook threw for 298 yards and 4 TD passes, no interceptions. Could he be eyeing the Rookie of the Year Award?
