

Wrestlers Begin Winter Practice

Coach Onorato noted that "This year's team is the toughest and most experienced team I've worked with at Behrend. We have looked good in practice and are stronger than previous teams here."

One weakness the team shows is the lack of depth. With only 5 back-up men and the loss of Denny Cook—133 pounds, because of knee surgery, depth could be an influencing factor.

The grapplers are expected to face the toughest wrestling schedule since Mr. Onorato's taking over as head coach. The season opens with the Boyce Campus of Allegheny Community College, who finished third in the junior college regional finals last year. Other teams expected to provide stiff competition include Lorain, Penn State Frosh and Clarion Frosh.

The highlight of the Cubs' dual meets will be the appearance of the Penn State Frosh on January 17 at Erie Hall. This will be the first meeting between Behrend and the University Park Team in wrestling.

Coach Onorato and the team are looking forward to an exciting season and feel the campus may hold its first regional champ in Bill Groner who finished third last year.

Bill will move to the 118 pound class with the intention of extending the unscored upon opening string into the 1969-70 season. Last year Bill appeared in five matches pinning three opponents and blanking the other two.
