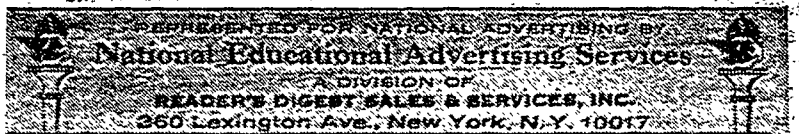

Bruce Zimmerman, Student Director, will be attending the Annual Association of College Unions Conference in Houston, Texas from March 19-26. (Whoopie) He has been invited by Edwin Sigelkow, Director of Unions at the University of Minnesota to lead a discussion group of other Union Directors in a session entitled: "What the Hell does this mean to me?" The session will highlight the major keynoters of the Conference, making a gut level attempt to analyze where Union programming is today in relation to the notions expressed by the keynote speakers. Summer Term Loans
Are Available Now

UNIVERSITY PARK, PA., MARCH—Applications for National Defense Student Loans and University loans for the Summer Term, beginning in June, or the 1970-71 academic year, beginning in September, now are available at the Office for Student Aid at The Pennsylvania State University.

Completed applications for Summer Term loans, as well as the Parents' Confidential Financial Statements, also supplied by the Office for Student Aid, must be submitted no later than Friday, April 10.

Applications for grants or loans for the 1970-71 year must be filed no later than Friday, May 8.

Students who wish to renew their 1969-70 Educational Opportunity Grants, Disadvantaged Grants and/or National Defense Student Loans must also file new applications by the appropriate deadline.

Students seeking to renew their financial assistance must also have a new Parents' Confidential Financial Statement completed and forwarded to the College Scholarship Service for evaluation.

Preference for National Defense Student Loans will be given to students who exhibit the greatest financial need. Preference for University loans will be given to University scholarship recipients who require additional aid and to students approaching their graduation.

Students receiving either National Defense or University loans are not required to begin repayment until after their graduation or departure for whatever reason from the University.

Interest on National Defense loans runs 3 per cent each year. Interest on University loans runs 2 per cent the first year, 4 per cent the second year, and 6 per cent each succeeding year.

Students at Commonwealth Campuses should contact their Office of Student Affairs for aid applications.

Students who seek loans guaranteed by the Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency in Harrisburg should contact the loan officer at one of their hometown banks. Applications for the state-guaranteed loan program are usually available at the local lending institution.
