The Nittany Lions close their season against Rutgers in New Brunswick, N.Y., Saturday (March 6) at 8 p.m. Bach is a little grayer and a

little lighter after Tuesday's 86-85 overtime loss at Kent State.

The loss dropped the Lions' season record to 10-11 and kept Bach from getting his 300th coaching victory. The Lion coach
