Freshmen In **Education Sec**

It is University policy for freshmen to remain in the Common Year program for their first three terms. To progress into teacher education majors or rehabilitation, students must request admission prior to the end of their third term

It has been the policy of the College of Education for several years to admit students to a degree program of their choice if they meet the following criteria:

- 1. Are eligible to continue in the
- University. Achieve "C" level or above in 2. oral and written expression (English 1 and 3, or 2, and Speech 200)
- Achieve "C" level or above in psychology, sociology, and philosophy
- Meet the special additional requirements of the several departments
- Have been screened by the Speech and Hearing Clinic and have been cleared as a teacher candidate or is receiving corrective therapy (students on Commonwealth Campuses may delay this action until they arrive at University Park.)

When the student is not accepted by the department of his choice, he must seek another degree program, or ask to be referred into the Division of Counseling for career and personal guidance. We will not allow a student to continue to enroll as a general education student after the third term. If the student fails to initiate the required action to change to another college or to the Division of Counseling, administrative steps will be taken to advise him that he will not be allowed to register in the College of Education.

During the past several years, the provisions of this policy have not always been strictly en-forced. In particular, those students on Commonwealth Campuses have been permitted greater latitude. It is anticipated that from now on the policies regulation selection and retention. of students seeking admission to teacher education programs will be complied with as closely as possible.

It is suggested that all incoming freshmen, who indicate a choice of education as a major be advised of these policies.
