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WATER SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS TO BE GIVEN

The Hazleton Chapter American Red Cross is offering a 30 hour course in Water Safety Instruction at the Hazleton Senior High School Swimming Pool the weeks of May 9 and May 16 from 7:00 to 10:00 P.M. Monday through Friday.

The first week of instruction will be a review of Senior Life Saving and Water Safety skills and will be taught by a certified Red Cross Instructor. The second week will be an Instructor and Instructor Review Course and will be taught by Daniel Donovan, Safety Service Representative from the Eastern Area Office of the American National Red Cross.

Any person 18 years of age who holds a current Senior Life Saving Certificate with the Red Cross is eligible to enroll.

There is no charge for the course. Registration will be held at the Chapter House or phone Gladstone 4-6621 before May 9.
