

The money will be secured from a collateral loan at a local bank. This loan, backed by the University, will be paid off through student assessment funds, proceeds from the sale of food, and gifts to the school.

Harry Lentz, local architect will draw the plans. He will have the assistance of university officials and building specialists on the project. A local construction company will be employed for construction of the building, which should begin in late winter or early spring.

The building will be about 100 feet long and 60 feet wide. It will be constructed so that future expansion is possible.

The new structure will be located about 150 feet southwest of the main building. In addition to recreation facilities and a snack bar, it will house student publications, student societies and clubs, and various other activities, which are now cramped into small quarters here and there on the campus.
