DuMars Sets Scoring Pace For University Park Five

Sophomore Mark DuMars set the scoring pace for the 1958-59 edition of Penn State basketball as he averaged 16.8 points per game. The 5'10" backcourt ace from Sharon netted 134 field goals and 67 fouls for a total of 337 points as the Nittany Lions won 11 and lost 9. He had a 39.2 field goal percentage.

Backcourter Wally Colender, a junior, took runner-up honors with 323 for a 16.1 scoring average.

Senior Bob Edwards was the only other regular to average double figures, scoring 257 for a 12.8 average.

The top rebounder was Tom Hancock with a 204 total or 10 per game. The 6'5" senior owned the top field goal shooting percentage with a 41.8 mark.

As a team, State scored a total of 1,432 points, averaging 71.5 a game. The Lions held 20 opponents to 1328 points for a 66.4 average.

STUDENTS ADVISED TO SUBMIT SSQT APPLICATIONS NOW

Applications for the April 30, 1959 administration of the College Qualification Test are now available at Selective Service System local boards throughout the country.

Eligible students who intend to take this test should apply at once to the nearest Selective Service local board for an application and a bulletin of information.

Following instructions in the bulletin, the student should fill out his application and mail it immediately in the envelope provided to SELECTIVE SERVICE EXAMINING SECTION, Educational Testing Service, P.O. Box 586, Princeton, New Jersey. Applications for the April 30 test must be postmarked no later than midnight, April 9, 1959.

According to Educational Testing Service, it will be greatly to the student's advantage to file an application for the results will be reported to the student's Selective Service local board of jurisdiction for use in considering his deferment as a student.
