

PENN STATE SLUGS WVU, 28-10
(Oct. 31)

Seventh-ranked and unbeaten Penn State shrugged off mistakes with explosive long-gainers today for a convincing 28-10 victory over West Virginia.

The Nittany Lions led 20-0 at the half en route to their seventh straight victory while setting the stage for this Saturday's battle against fifth-ranked and unbeaten Syracuse. WVU only last week was whipped by Syracuse, 42-0.

State lost three fumbles at the most inopportune moments. Two of the bobbles set up a touchdown and field goal for the losing Mountaineers. A third thwarted a possible Penn State score.

The Mountaineers, led by guard Bill Lopasky, were able to hold widely heralded Richie Lucas pretty much in check, but they couldn't cope with aggressive line play and the corps of fleet Penn State backs.

The Nittany Lions spotted WVU a 3-0 lead in the opening minutes on a 39-yard field goal by Johnny Thackston. The kick was set up by a Penn State fumble on its own 22 on the first play after the kickoff.

But the Lions wasted little time springing into a lead which they never surrendered. Halfback Jimmy Kerr put them ahead to stay by picking off a WVU pass and racing 25 yards unmolested for a TD.

Lucas, boomed by Penn State supporters for All-America, was limited to 63 yards in total offense before retiring from the game in the third period. He entered the game averaging more than 133 yards both rushing and passing.
