After the Berlin Congress, the I.A.C. reorganized its territory as the Congo Free State. Reports of horrendous atrocities, e.g., cutting off hands of natives as a means of census taking, caused international pressure to be brought against Belgium. To obtain better control over internal conditions, Belgium took possession of the Congo on October 18, 1908, as a colony, a status maintained until 1960.
