Information For Handicapped Veterans

The enactment of PL 87-815, October 15, 1962, makes vocarehabilitation tional training available for the first time to veterans who incurred a peacetime disability as a result of service in the armed forces during the periods July 26, 1947 to June 26, 1950, and February 1, 1955 to the present. If you are receiving compensation from the government because of a disability incurred during either of these periods, you may apply for vocational rehabilitation by obtaining VA form 22-1900 at your nearest VA Office and sending it to the Veterans Administration at 128 N. Broad Street, Philadelphia 2, Pa.

Applicants will be provided vocational counseling to ascertain what training they may need to overcome any handicapping effects of their disabilities, and to assist them in making a choice of a future occupation. The Veterans Administration will pay for boks and tuition and subsistence allowance during the period of training which may be needed for this purpose. Training will not be provided under this Act for veterans whose disabilities are rated at less than 30% unless they show clearly that the disobility causes a pronounced employment handicap.


