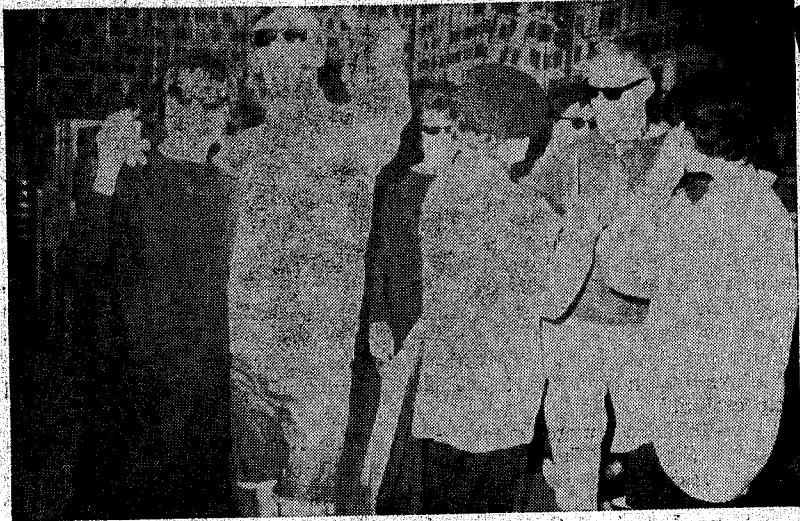


FALL SOCIAL EVENTS HUGE SUCCESS AT H.U.C.

The Hazleton Campus of the Pennsylvania State University was host to a conference of the Organization of Student Government Associations on November 1 and 2. The Penn State Center and its thirteen Commonwealth Campuses were represented at the fall meeting by approximately sixty delegates and fifteen faculty advisors. Official host for the affair was Richard Grovich, president of the Hazleton O. S. G. A.

From 4 until 6 p. m. on November 1, the agenda included the first general session, greetings from the host campus, dinner, and various discussion groups.

The annual Harvester's dance was held from 9 p. m. to midnight, and music was provided by the Velmonts. During the affair, there was a presentation of the key to the city by Councilman Wilbur Koch to the O. S. G. A. President Joseph Tipping. The dance was open to the public, and an enjoyable evening was had by all in attendance.

On November 2, the discussion groups continued from 9 to 10:45 a. m., followed by the second general session. The luncheon meeting was held at 12:00 in the Student Union Building.
