

## BLOODMOBILE VISITS HIGHACRES 101 DONATE

The Red Cross Bloodmobile which visits the Highacres Campus every year was present on campus January 27. The quota for the campus was 160 pints of blood, which represented approximately one fourth of the student population. This quota was not met; however, 101 students and faculty members turned out to donate blood. Nine were deferred for medical reasons. 69 of the donors were giving for their first time, and one student, Frederick George, received a three gallon pin. Mrs. Margaret Tamea, resident nurse at Highacres, and Everitt Binns, Assistant Dean of Student Affairs, oversaw the program. The facilities for the Bloodmobile were arranged by student members of the S.G.A. and the Student Union Board.
