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
LANE SPEAKS TO 700 Exclusive Collegian Intriew With Mark Lane Ruge 14 By Elliot Grossman

The foremost critic in the world of the Warren's Commission's report on the John F. Kennedy assasination, Mark Lane, spoke to a crowd of 700 people in the Physical Education Building on Wednesday night, January 19. The lecture was sponsored by The Student Affairs Cultural Series and The Highacres Club Advisory Council. Lane spoke for three hours and his remarks were well received by the crowd, as was apparent by the almost 300 signatures that appeared on a mailgram to Thomas O'Neill, Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives, asking for a reinvestigation of the Kennedy and King assasinations.

Lane's speech was divided into three parts. His first part, which was the most lengthy portion of his speech, dealt with Lane's opinions of the investigation of the F.B.I., the C.I.A., and the Warren Commission into the Kennedy assasination.

"I believe that the Warren Commission was appointed for the purpose of assuring the American people that a conspiracy never occurred- for proving that Oswald was the lone assasin," said Lane.

However, Lane concluded that Kennedy was shot from two Continued on Page 8
