So indicates the results of a national attitude survey conducted by the American Council on Education and the University of California at Los Angeles. The survey was administered to 315 first year students at Highacres as part of a University-wide survey.

The two most important goals for men were becoming an authority in their field and being well-off financially. However, these goals were ranked fifth and seventh, respectively, by women. The first choice of women, helping others in difficulty, ranked fifth among men.

A large percentage of men and women felt it important to raise a family and develop a philosophy of life. Women placed a philosophy third and family fourth, whereas men's responses were reversed, placing family third and philosophy fourth. Both men and women placed obtaining recognition from their colleagues in fifth position.

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
