As part of their victory statement, the winning candidates pledged to revise the present system for allocating monies to S.G.A. clubs and organizations.

The new officers also see the need for increased inter-campus communication. "We plan to improve campus communication through intensive cooperation with THE HIGHACRES COLLEGIAN and the campus radio station WHCB," Rovito said. "We want to make students more aware of S.G.A. and we have tentative plans for an S.G.A. Newsletter," said Parsons.
