On November 28th there was an ice cream party in the lobby of the Residence Hall. Any RHSA member was allowed to eat as much ice cream as he wished.

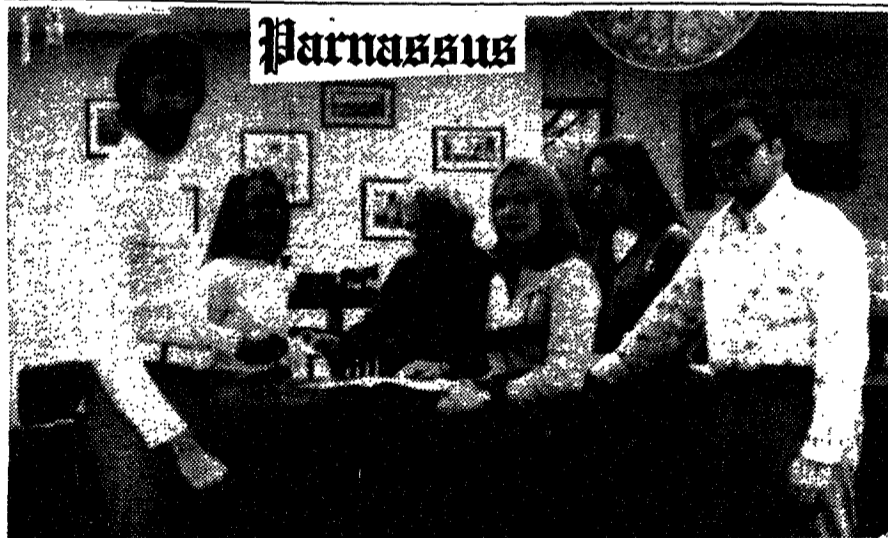
On December 7th, pictures were taken with the Nittany Lion in front of the Christmas tree. A total of 93 pictures were taken.
