**Students Drink Responsibly**

GOLDEN, Colo -- College students from across the country are drinking alcohol more responsibly, according to the Coors Light College Survey of 750 college students.

Conducted among students age 21 years or older, the Coors Light Campus Survey measures students' attitudes about issues affecting them today. Surveys were conducted at the University of Texas, the University of Colorado, San Diego State University, Penn State University, Florida State University and the University of Vermont.

Contrary to the common stereotype, college students say they are concerned about drinking responsibly and the majority believe their fellow students share their concerns.

Sixty-one percent of survey respondents say they are concerned about drinking in moderation. Of that group, 30 percent say they are "very concerned" about the issue. More than half of the students surveyed (53 percent) say students have become more concerned about drinking in moderation during recent years, and nine out of 10 respondents say they are concerned about having a designated driver.
