She had a long career with the IBM Corporation in public affairs and government relations, and was economic development consultant to the Atlanta, Georgia Department of Community and Human Development.

At Penn State, Callery is a member of the campus executive committee, marketing board, and economic development, cultural diversity, and campus development advisory committees. Active in Hazleton as well, she is a board member of the Greater Hazleton YWCA and Leadership Hazleton. She has served as a facilitator for Leadership Hazleton programs for the past four years. She is also a member of the Hazleton League of Woman Voters, the Northeast Pennsylvania Economic Development Council, the Hazleton Area Management Club, the Penn State Club of Greater Hazleton, and past board member of the Hazleton Red Cross.

She is a member of the National Society of Fund Raising Executives, the Council for Advancement and Support of Education, and a past member of the Council on Urban Economic Development.
