Radiation!!! Evacuation!!!

Not too many years ago, a serious nuclear emergency happened not too far from here. Most of us are probably too young to remember the Three Mile Island incident, or maybe some of us are too busy to remember something that happened last week, let alone over ten years ago, but what if something did happen?

The Susquehanna Steam Electric Station has an emergency planning zone which encompasses the ten-mile radius around the Susquehanna plant; the Penn State Hazleton Campus is just within this radius. What would you do if the sirens sounded to alert the local communities of a nuclear emergency? Would you know what to do in the case of an emergency?

The U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission has set up four categories under which any events or problems would fall. In order of increasing seriousness, they are the following: Unusual Event, Alert, Site Area Emergency, and General Emergency. An Unusual Event is a minor problem at the plant without any release of radioactive material. No public action is required but you should try to stay informed by listening to local news and radio stations. Both T.V. channel 28 WBRE and radio channel 98.5 WKRZ are Emergency Broadcast System stations. An Alert is a minor problem at the plant which most likely does not need residents to respond. Listen for a three-to-five minute steady siren, tune into an Emergency Broadcast System station, listen for information and instructions, and keep phone lines open. Site Area Emergencies and General Emergencies are more serious In a Site Area Emergency, problems. radioactivity should be confined within the bounds of the plant, but in a General Emergency, radioactivity has been released beyond the plant boundary. Follow all instructions from the previous categories and follow directions as outlined by support services and broadcasts.

If you are instructed to evacuate, take only the essentials and know the reception area for your community. Conyngham Borough and the Hazleton Campus share the same reception center Marian High School. You can get to Marian by taking Rt. 93 to Interstate 81-S to Rt. 54-E, or by taking Rt. 309-S to 54-E. Make arrangements, not everyone on campus has a car and you may be the one in need of transportation. Plan ahead, be aware of what is around you, and remember that a little preparation can save lives.
