A box has been placed in the Walnut Street building and donations may be placed there. On the list of materials are:

Clothing of all kinds, bedding, shoes tied in pairs, children's books, cotton feed bags, felt hats, Bibles, table ware but not chinaware, bar soap, toys, kitchen utensils, sewing supplies, games, cutlery, galoshes.

Dolls, linens, farm tools and harness, school supplies, candles and stubs, any kind of seeds, stockings and sox, hand tools, bicycles, toilet supplies, and ladies' handbags.

Donations are to be wrapped or bundled. A city-wide door-to-door collection is being made.
