Arrangements for the dance and Coronation were made by the Student Activities Board.

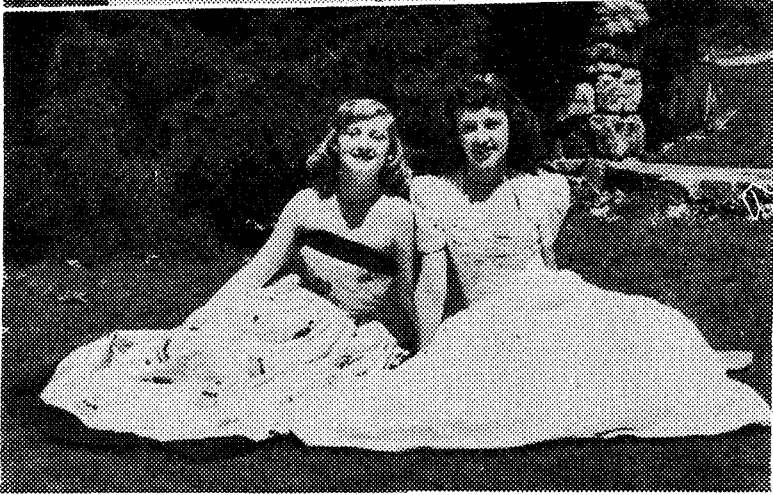
Transfer Questionnaires
