

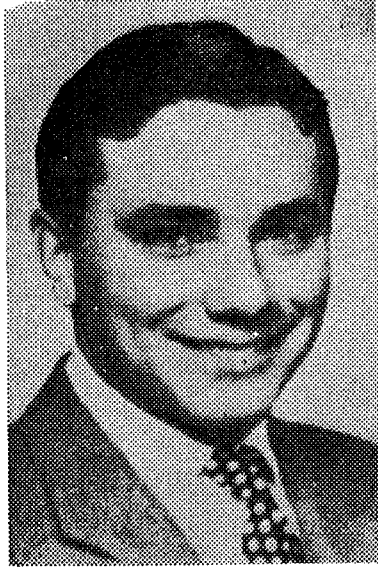
Chemistry Instructor

English Instructors

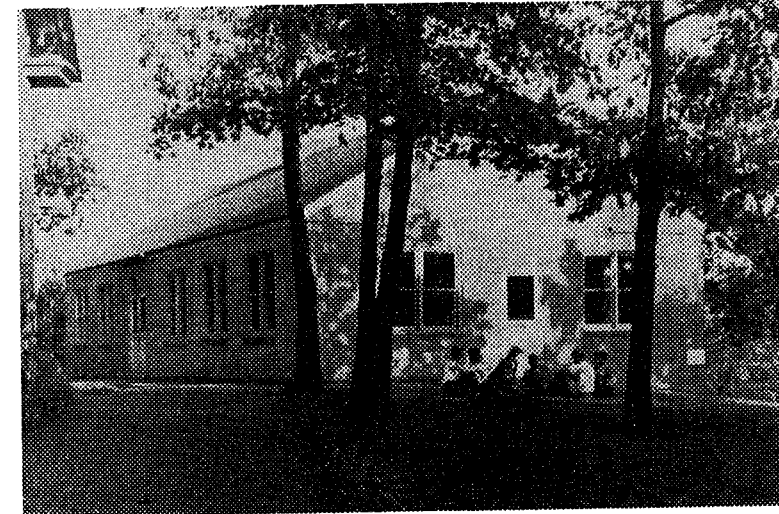
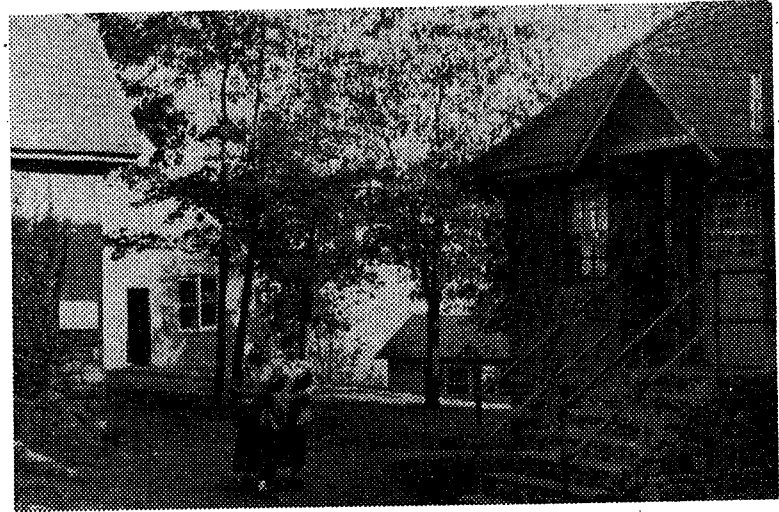


Frederick Ciletti
