George Chriss commented on the benefits of a webpage or a project like ANGEL compared to a Wiki, "When you have a webpage or some other project, you have one or two individuals updating a page and the information is then

to those one or two people's viewpoints. The information would turn out to seem very polished and probably wouldn't be as comprehensive or beneficial to the needs of students," Chriss said.

The software package which Penn State would receive, Chriss said, would person's user ID. Though it is

viewable to the world, it cannot be edited unless you have an authentic PSU ID. In addition, the Penn State's software package would have a history page where you can see what changes and when made them Hypothetically, this factor would discourage people from writing unethical comments because the students would be suspended from the site and subsequently, referred to Judicial Affairs for reprimand.
