A FEW FACTS ABOUT CHESTER, PA. Our present Delaware County Campus site is located in the City of Chester, Pa. The city is located on the Delaware River thirteen miles west of Philadelphia. With a population of 63,658, and an area of 4,77 square miles, Chester is a third class city, consisting of a mayor and a City Council. Last's week's election's returned the present mayor, Mayor James H. Gorbey, to another four year term. This continued the Republican trend, which has long existed in the city. Chester, the oldest town in the state, is of historical significance to our State. Located at the fool of Penn Street, is a marking of William Penn's landing. Chester was formerly called Upland, but it was renamed by William Penn in 1683.
