Constitution Ready

The campus newspaper will shortly submit its new constitution to the Student Government Association. The document has been drawn up and approved by the paper's advisor, Mr. Symser. If the constitution is approved by the SGA, it will then be submitted to the committee on Student Affairs and eventually sent to University Park for final action.

The proposed constitution is based upon that in use by the Daily Collegiant. It was drawn up with the help of the campus administrator, Mr. Vairo, who is an officer of the University Park Daily.

The machinery proposed by the document would center around a board of directors, consisting of ten members, five students and five members of the administration and/or faculty. This board of directors would set policy for the cam-
