Campus Expansion

A part of each students tuition is ear-marked by the University to the student government. The SGA is, in effect, spending your money. Yet in spite of all these facts most students seem unable to attend the meetings. There might be reason for this if representatives had been elected to deal with the problems and progress of the campus, but such is not the case. It remains the responsibility of each student to take some interest in his own affairs. This may be best done by taking part in these weekly meetings.
