Students planning to transfer to U. Park or any other Commonwealth Campus for Spring Term 1976 and before the completion of their sixth term must complete a Change of Assignment Request Form within first ten calendar days of the Winter Term 1976. This form can be obtained from Dean Linder.

A Course Repeat Form can be obtained in Room 312M. By filing such a form, you can remove one "F" only in any particular course from your cumulative average, although it will continue to show on your transcript.

Students wishing to Change their Major effective Winter Term 1976, must file a form during the first ten calendar days of Winter Term. If a change of major is made at a later date, it will not become effective until Spring Term 1976.

Mr. Phillip Berrigan will speak at the campus on December 10th at 12:15 p.m. in Room 101. His topic will be "The Nuclear Horror Story." Berrigan, the author of several books and co-founder of the Catholic Peace Fellowship, gained national notoriety in 1968 when he, his brother, and seven others burned draft files in Catonsville, Maryland. For that action, and an earlier defacing of draft files in Baltimore, Berrigan served almost three years in federal prison.

While serving the sentence, Berrigan was indicted for conspiring with seven others to kidnap Henry Kissinger, and blow up federal office buildings in Washington, D.C. After a 1971 trial in Harrisburg, he was acquitted of those charges, but was found guilty of smuggling letters through the federal prison system. He was released from prison in 1972.

OTIS is the Organization for Town Independent Students located in room 20 of the Hetzel Union Building - better known as the HUB.

Each year OTIS publishes a computerized housing list which gives the address of apartment complexes then breaks down each realtor from their property. of Student Affairs.


